District 1: Townships of Hill, Spirit, Rib Lake & Tomahawk

Mark Nyberg



Mark lives in Ogema and has been a member of PEC for 26 years. He is a substitute teacher and a Christmas tree grower with Nyberg Tree Farm. He previously worked as a supported employment coordinator for Black River Industries, in auto sales, and as a fast food manager.

Mark enjoys a number of hobbies, including bowling, golf, fishing, hunting, attending high school sports events, and supporting the Packers, Brewers, Bucks, and Badgers. He belongs to the Wisconsin Christmas Tree Growers Association, is president of the First Lutheran Church in Ogema, and is a member of the Spirit Historical Association.

Mark has served his communities in other capacities, including holding a seat on his church council for nearly 30 years, and a seat on the Price County Town Mutual Insurance board for ten years.

When asked why he's the best choice for a PEC directorship, Mark said, "I've always had an interest in serving the people of the area. I feel that I have always been there for others. I have a

great interest in modern technology and look forward to seeing how it can be utilized by Price Electric."

Mark is running unopposed in District 1. Michael Meier, the current director, is retiring at the end of his term.

coordinator at Forest Springs, and works as a private piano instructor. She previously worked as the financial secretary at Forest Springs.

Joan has many hobbies and interests, including playing piano for weddings, funerals, church, choirs, and soloists. She also accompanies the Rib Lake High School choir and students performing for solo/ensemble, and the Community Ecumenical Choir. She is active as a Sunday school and youth club Bible teacher, and enjoys exploring state and national parks and historical sites, walking in nature to observe birds and wildflowers, attending music concerts and drama productions, and spending time with her family,

which includes five granddaughters and one grandson.

Joan is a former member of the Rib Lake School board, having served for 12 years, as well as holding a seat on the CESA #9 board for nine years. She has been a member of the Woodland Community Church in Westboro for 39 years, and has been the accompanist for the Community Ecumenical Choir for eight years.

Joan's experience and qualifications include the following: she was appointed to the PEC Board in 2017 to fill a vacancy; she was then elected in June 2018 to finish the remaining term. She is in the process of completing her Credentialed Cooperative Director coursework, which is a cooperative designation. She has attended NRECA regional, Dairyland regional, and state WECA lobby days meetings. Joan is open to hearing PEC member input, has experience with non-profit functions, and is a consumer of rural electrification. She has served on the Wisconsin Association of School Boards (WASB) policy committee. She works well with others in reaching decisions for the common good, has presided over board meetings in other settings, has helped to formulate and submit policy recommendations to the WASB delegates at the WASB state convention, and has an understanding of Robert's Rules of Order.

Joan has served as treasurer, clerk, and president of the Rib Lake school board, served as a member and president of the CESA #9 board, has mediated between taxpayers, teachers, and administration, and has been an advocate for students.

When asked why she is the best choice for the PEC board, Joan said, "Since joining the PEC board, I have been faithful in attendance, prepared through reviewing materials in advance, demonstrated a desire to learn, and attempted to contribute intelligently at the board meetings. I am approachable to members, and willing to listen to any feedback they might have, whether a critique, comment, or compliment. I have an interest in formulation of policy and procedure, so have often contributed towards the wording of such. I am willing to approach state politicians to advocate for rural electrification. I am appreciative of the Price Electric Cooperative administration and employees and the expertise and quality they bring to their work environment, whether in the field, the shop, or the office."

He is a dairy farmer, and also spends time hunting, woodworking, metalworking, logging, baking, and doing mechanic work.

Ed currently serves as the Town of Hackett chairman, and is a Price County Equity Cooperative board member. He previously held a seat on the Price County Town Insurance board.

Ed has been the chairman of PEC's board of directors since 2008, and has completed the available certifications for cooperative directors, including Credentialed Cooperative Director, Board Leadership Certification, and Director Gold certification. Ed has served on a number of board committees.

When asked why he is the best choice for the PEC board, Ed said, "My track record of encouraging a common-sense approach toward governance of the Cooperative

has been important in maintaining fiscal responsibility to the membership. A long-term, 'big picture' method to address board discussions that result in decisions that ensure the viability of the Cooperative for years to come is necessary to balance the operation of the business as well as relationships with members.
